BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY  
OF THE CITY OF WICHITA, KANSAS.

**SECTION 1.** That having received a recommendation from the Planning Commission, and proper notice having been given and hearing held as provided by law and under authority and subject to the provisions of The Wichita-Sedgwick County Unified Zoning Code, Section V-C, as adopted by Section 28.04.010, as amended, the zoning classification or districts of the lands legally described hereby are changed as follows:

**Case No. ZON2021-00044**

City zone change from SF-5 Single-Family Residential to TF-3 Two-Family Residential on zoning lot described as:

Lot 7, in Reeves Second Addition to Wichita, Sedgwick County, Kansas.


Subject to **Protective Overlay #385**.

1. **Garages.** The garage face shall occupy no more than 50 percent of the ground-level façade facing the street and may not project more than five feet in front of the main facade.
2. **Entrances.** Pedestrian scaled entry shall be a prominent feature of the front elevation. Front doors shall be oriented to the street in front of the units.
3. **Windows and Transparency.** Transparent windows and/or doors facing the street are required. To meet this requirement, at least 10 percent of the façade must be transparent. The façade is measured from the base of the house to the start of the roofline and any other vertical walls facing the street, except for gabled portions of the facade not containing livable floor area. Garages facing the street shall count as part of the façade.
4. **Roof Design.** Roofs shall have variation in roof planes in order to break up the large roof mass through dormers, gables, or changes in elevation. Roof forms and roof pitches of porches, dormers and garages shall be consistent and complement the building style within the neighborhood.
5. **Siding materials.** Siding materials shall be appropriate to the architectural style of the structure. Traditional materials consistent with the neighborhood architectural styles are encouraged such as wood, masonry and brick. Siding materials and window trim should be consistent on all sides of the structures.
6. **HVAC.** HVAC units shall be located away from the front of the buildings and screened from public view through landscaping and/or screen walls.

**SECTION 2.** That upon the taking effect of this ordinance, the above zoning changes shall be entered and shown on the "Official Zoning Map" previously adopted by reference, and said official zoning map is hereby reincorporated as a part of the Wichita -Sedgwick County Unified Zoning Code as amended.

**SECTION 3.** That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption and publication in the official City paper.

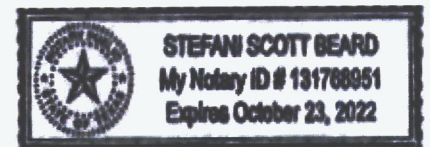

# Congress juggles funding, debt limit, Biden agenda

WASHINGTON — President Joe Biden's economic agenda faces a pivotal day in Congress Wednesday, with the prospects growing of an embarrassing setback for his infrastructure bill and markets beginning to take notice of the intensifying debt ceiling standoff with Republicans.

Senate Majority Chuck Schumer said he anticipates Congress will avert a government shutdown by passing a stopgap spending bill before current funding expires Friday. But he was not as optimistic on efforts to sus-

pend the debt ceiling, which Republicans have refused to do.

"We're just asking Republicans to get out of the way," Schumer said on the Senate floor.

Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen has warned that a default looms on Oct. 18 without congressional action.

Concerns about the current impasse in Washington over the debt limit and other fiscal measures contributed to the biggest selloff in equities since May. The 2% drop in the S&P 500 Index was partially reversed in Wednesday trading.

Congress appears to be working toward averting a shutdown of nonessential

government functions after the end of the fiscal year on Thursday. As soon as Wednesday evening, the Senate planned to take up the stopgap spending bill extending funding through Dec. 3 and providing billions in disaster aid and funds for Afghan refugees. The House plans to quickly follow suit.

Democrats earlier attempted to use the stopgap measure as a vehicle for a debt ceiling suspension but Republicans blocked that effort in the Senate.

For now, Democrats are trying to win public support. They plan to pass a stand-alone debt limit bill in the House to highlight the issue and continue to seek GOP consent in the

Senate to pass the debt limit with just 51 votes instead of the usual 60 votes.

Republicans continue to press Democrats to use the same fast-track budget process to raise the debt ceiling without GOP support they plan to use for the tax and spending measure that encompasses much of Biden's agenda.

Across the Capitol, Speaker Nancy Pelosi faces a hard choice of

many of their priorities. "I think if we come to a place where we have agreement in legislative language, not just principle but legislative language that the president supports," Pelosi said, "and then I think we will come together."

To unlock the second larger bill, the House is waiting on Senate moderates led by Joe Manchin of West Virginia and Krystina Sinema of Arizona to reveal the price tag they'll support. Manchin has hinted he could back \$1.5 trillion while Sinema has been more circumspect.

Biden was personally negotiating with the two senators and canceled a trip to Chicago to coincide those talks.

Without some deal between Biden and the moderates, it is increasingly likely that the infrastructure bill will fall on the House floor or that Pelosi will pull it from the schedule. As a result, the entire Biden agenda could languish in Congress for months.

# Kansas leaders have failed in attempts to expand Medicaid. Will Congress do it for them?

WASHINGTON — For nearly a decade, politicians in Kansas have sought to expand access to Medicaid only to be blocked by conservative Republicans.

Gov. Sam Brownback vetoed a bi-partisan effort in 2017, citing the lack of work requirements for beneficiaries and a failure to defund Planned Parenthood. Senate President Susan Wagle scuttled another bi-partisan agreement in 2020, making passage contingent on approval of an anti-abortion constitutional amendment.

Now, Democrats in Washington, D.C. are on the verge of stepping in. "State after state has chosen to expand Medicaid and protect the health of their most vulnerable residents, but Kansas continues to suffer solely because partisan actors have repeatedly chosen to leave money on the table," said Kansas U.S. Rep. Sharice Davids. "Kansas have

made their voices clear on this — that's why we are exploring every avenue, including continued financial incentives for states and a federal option to close the Medicaid coverage gap."

Among the many provisions in the mammoth budget bill Democrats are calling "Build Back Better" is a new Medicaid program to provide health insurance for most low-income adults in the 12 states, like Kansas, that have not expanded eligibility for coverage. The expansion, a provision of the 2010 Affordable Care Act, would cover households making up to 138 percent of the federal poverty line, or \$36,570 for a family of four.

It may be the only shot to extend coverage to the estimated 165,000 Kansans who don't have health insurance. The latest efforts to expand Medicaid have attracted little support in Topeka.

"I don't think it's in the cards in this building for 2022," State Sen. Pat Pettry, a Kansas City, Kansas Democrat said in Topeka last week. "We haven't been able as a Legislature

to even have, I would say within the last 2 years, to even have a significant conversation about Medicaid expansion."

Any federal Medicaid expansion relies on Democrats agreeing to pass a budget bill packed with legislative priorities, from universal pre-kindergarten to combating climate change. The status of the package is tenuous. Conservative Democrats in the Senate have chafed at the \$3.5 trillion cost, and House and Senate Democrats are negotiating what portions to cut.

Some of the bill's health-care provisions have been part of the negotiations, such as whether to allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices with pharmaceutical companies, another measure supported by Davids. The provision creating a federal Medicaid program for people in the "coverage gap," however, has stayed uncontroversial.

If the provision remains and the bill becomes law, the Secretary of Health and Human Services would have until 2025 to create a new program to administer

Medicaid to the newly eligible recipients.

Until the program is set up, they would be able to get subsidies to purchase coverage in the federal health insurance marketplace.

Depending on how the program is set up, the federal work-around means the state potentially would not have to spend any money on insurance coverage for the expanded Medicaid population — even though the federal government covers 90 percent of the cost for states that have expanded.

But it also means they won't get a say over running the program and how to best tailor it for Kansas.

"It would be great to have those people insured but we do lose the opportunity to make it a Kansas program, to put our own stamp on things," said Kansas state Rep. Susan Cannon, a Beloit Republican who supports Medicaid expansion.

Expansion proponents said they would still like to see the Kansas legislature pass a bill. April Holliman, Executive Director of the

Alliance for a Healthy Kansas, said she would like to see a program tailored to the needs of Kansas, which would require expansion by the legislature instead of a federal work-around.

Concannon said she hoped the state's lack of control over the work-around would encourage conservatives who have resisted expansion to come to the negotiating table.

A federal program may not have work requirements, which some conservatives have made a condition of expansion. The 2020 version of the bill crafted by Kelly and Senate Republican leader Jim Denning had a program that referred people to work, but didn't require it.

Still, the prospect of the federal government stepping in doesn't appear to have changed the minds of Republicans who opposed Medicaid expansion. Sen. Richard Hilderbrand, a Galena Republican and chair of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee, called it federal overreach and promised to seek ways to fight it if it goes through.

"The federal government is stepping way outside of its intent of what the founding fathers wanted it to be," Hilderbrand said. "We don't need any more federal programs and if it's a state issue like it has the states decide if they want it or they don't."

# Focus on boosters might hurt outreach for 1st-time shots

NEW YORK — The spread of COVID-19 vaccination requirements across the U.S. hasn't had the desired effect so far, with the number of Americans getting their first shots

plunging in recent weeks. And some experts worry that the move to dispense boosters could just make matters worse.

The fear is that the rollout of booster shots will lead some people to question the effectiveness of the vaccine in the first place.

"Many of my patients are already saying, 'If we need

a third dose, what was the point of the first?" said Dr. Jason Goldman, a physician in Coral Springs, Florida.

The average daily count of Americans getting a first dose of vaccine has been falling for six weeks, plummeting more than 50% from about 480,000 in early August to under 230,000 by the middle of

last week, according to the most recently available federal data.

An estimated 70 million vaccine-eligible Americans have yet to start vaccinations, despite a summer surge in infections, hospitalizations and deaths driven by the delta variant.

Experts have long said the key to ending the U.S. epidemic is vaccinating the vast majority of the American public — perhaps as much as 90% of an of the more than 283 million Americans age 12 and

older who are eligible for shots, only about 65% — 184 million — are fully vaccinated, according to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data. Children under 12 are not yet eligible to get vaccinated, meaning only about 55% of the U.S. public is fully protected.

More than 400,000 Americans got boosters at drugstores over the weekend, and 1 million more have signed up for them, according to White House officials.

done about it? Is there an investigation underway and what would be a reasonable timeline for the people of Kansas to know the truth about this? Was there price gouging and who made the money?"

The two FERC officials at the meeting told the senator they're doing what they can, but their power is limited. "We don't have jurisdiction over the price of the sale of natural gas; Congress deregulated that a number of years ago," Glick said. "I believe it

would be helpful if Congress would either get FERC or some other agency some sort of circuit breaker authority when there's extreme prices to impose some sort of limitations at certain times."

He and Christie told Marshall that the agency does have the authority to investigate whether prices were artificially inflated and they're working on that.

Wichita-area households are expected to pay between \$600 and \$750 of additional costs from the freeze, according to documents filed with the KCC.

For Kansas Gas Service customers, that could range from \$17.51 a month extra on gas bills over three years, to \$510-\$6 a month spread over 10 years.

Black Hills Energy, the No. 2 gas company in Wichita, has proposed charging an extra \$12.23 a month spread over five years.

In addition to the FERC investigation, Attorney

General Derek Schmidt is looking into whether the spiraling gas prices violated the Kansas Consumer Protection Act, a law designed to limit price increases on necessities during periods of emergency.

That law is also being invoked in a civil court case by the tiny city of Mulberry in southeast Kansas. James Zakoura, a prominent Kansas energy lawyer, is representing Mulberry and argues that gas suppliers engaged in price gouging and piracy during the freeze emergency.

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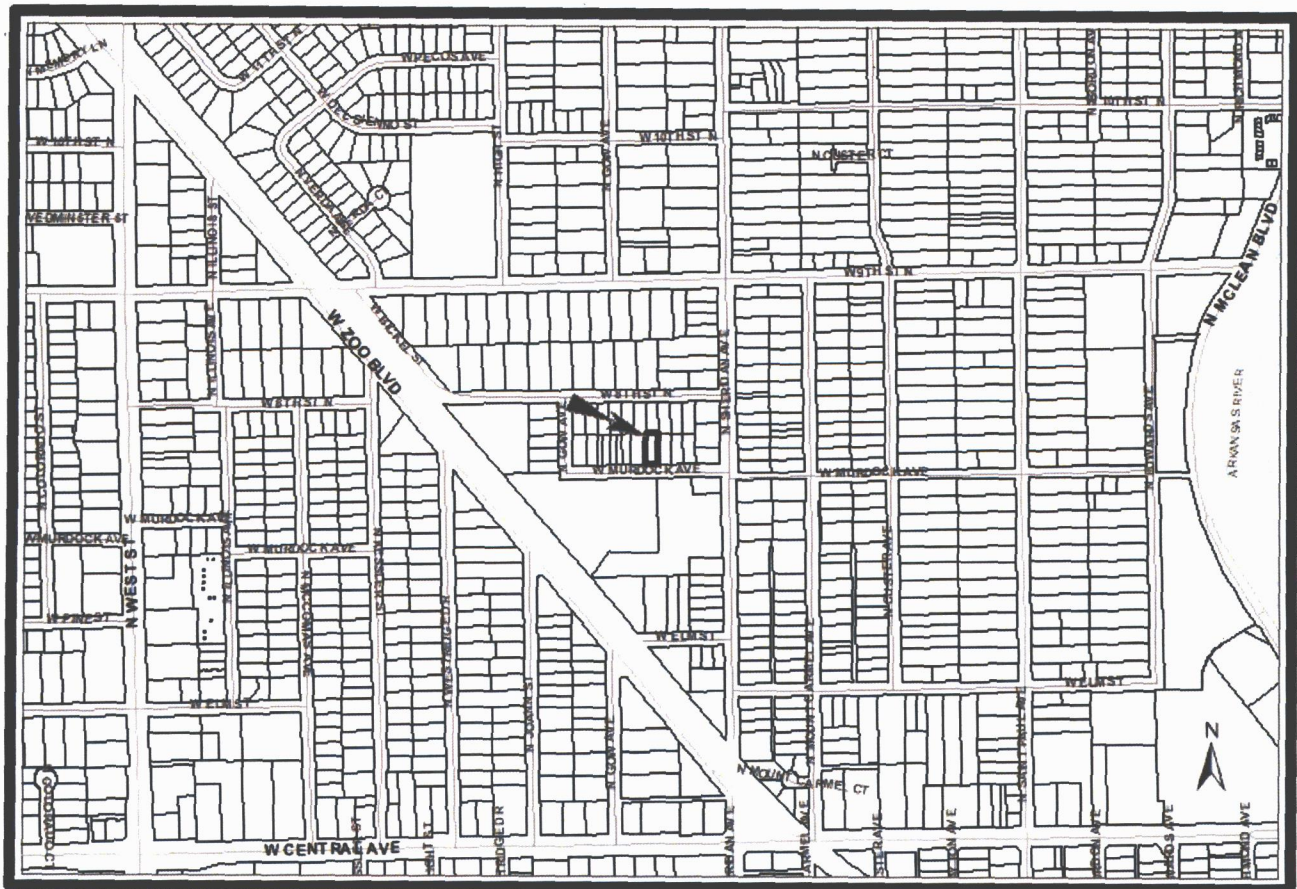

- LOCATION:** Generally located within one-quarter mile east of Zoo Boulevard and two blocks south of West 9<sup>th</sup> Street North along West Murdoch Street.
- PROPOSED USE:** Duplex



**BACKGROUND:** The applicant/owner is requesting the rezoning of Lot 7, Reeves 2<sup>nd</sup> Addition from SF-5 Single-Family Residential to TF-3 Two Family Residential. The subject property is generally located within one-quarter mile east of Zoo Boulevard and two blocks south of West 9th Street North along West Murdoch Street. The subject site is currently undeveloped.

The applicant does not have a site plan or elevations for the future duplex at this time. The duplex will be required to meet the property development standards of the TF-3 zoning district in the zoning code.

Properties to the north and west of the subject site are zoned SF-5 Single-Family Residential and developed with single-family homes. The property to the east of the subject site is zoned SF-5 Single Family Residential and is currently undeveloped. Properties to the south of the subject site are zoned B Multi-Family and developed with multi-family units.

**CASE HISTORY:** On August 16, 1956, the property was platted as Lot 7, Reeves 2<sup>nd</sup> Addition. No other zoning cases are associated with this property.

**ADJACENT ZONING AND LAND USE:**

NORTH:	SF-5	Single-family residences
SOUTH:	B	Multi-family residences
EAST:	SF-5	Undeveloped
WEST:	SF-5	Single-family residences

**PUBLIC SERVICES:** West Murdoch Street is a local, paved street with a 60-foot right-of-way and on-street parking. A sidewalk is located along the south side of West Murdoch Street. All municipal services are available to the property.

**CONFORMANCE TO PLANS/POLICIES:** The requested zoning would continue to allow the property to be in conformance with the Community Investments Plan and the Wichita: Places for People Plan.

**The Community Investments Plan:** The requested zoning aligns with the goals of the Community Investment Plan. The Community Investments Plan (the Wichita-Sedgwick County Comprehensive Plan) includes the 2035 Wichita Future Growth Concept Map. The Map identifies the area in which the site is located to be primarily appropriate for residential uses and defines residential uses as a variety of housing types including duplexes.

**Wichita: Places for People Plan:** The requested zoning aligns with the goals of the Wichita: Places for People Plan. The Wichita: Places for People Plan provides recommendations for urban infill development in the Established Central Area (ECA). The subject site is located within the ECA. In general, the ECA is envisioned as “a place for people - a place that provides for the movement of people - on foot, on bike and through transit - in balance with automobiles.”

- **Strategies:** The Plan recommends strategies to help guide the community in their actions to create walkable places within Wichita. The requested zoning aligns with Strategy 5, “Provide a diversity of housing options to attract new residents and allow existing residents to remain in the ECA.” The proposed duplex would provide a housing option that otherwise is limited in the area. The requested zoning also aligns with Strategy 6, “Encourage infill and redevelopment that is contextual to the environment in which it is occurring.” The proposed rezoning would allow infill within the undeveloped zoning lot that is residential in nature and compatible with the surrounding area.
- **Current Condition:** The subject property is located within an area identified as an “area of stability.” The Places for People Plan defines Areas of Stability as those “areas that exhibit less stress, or fewer economic, connectivity and accessibility issues than the Areas of Opportunity. Areas of Stability require fewer interventions and potentially less public investment to maintain a stable development environment and community.”

- **Nodal Development Pattern:** The Places for People Plan recommends a nodal development pattern that creates a critical mass at the center of a node and transitions in scale and intensity as uses shift from commercial to residential. The subject property does not fall within the node, transition, or edge areas of an identified node. The plan depicts Central and West as the nearest node and categorizes it as a “Community Core.”

**RECOMMENDATION:** Based upon the information available at the time the staff report was completed, staff recommends **APPROVAL** of the zone change request. Staff also recommends that the duplex conform to the *Wichita: Places for People* design recommendations (not requirements) as follows:

1. **Garages.** The garage face shall occupy no more than 50 percent of the ground-level façade facing the street and may not project more than five feet in front of the main facade.
2. **Entrances.** Pedestrian scaled entry shall be a prominent feature of the front elevation. Front doors shall be oriented to the street in front of the units.
3. **Windows and Transparency.** Transparent windows and/or doors facing the street are required. To meet this requirement, at least 10 percent of the façade must be transparent. The façade is measured from the base of the house to the start of the roofline and any other vertical walls facing the street, except for gabled portions of the facade not containing livable floor area. Garages facing the street shall count as part of the façade.
4. **Roof Design.** Roofs shall have variation in roof planes in order to break up the large roof mass through dormers, gables, or changes in elevation. Roof forms and roof pitches of porches, dormers and garages shall be consistent and complement the building style within the neighborhood.
5. **Siding materials.** Siding materials shall be appropriate to the architectural style of the structure. Traditional materials consistent with the neighborhood architectural styles are encouraged such as wood, masonry and brick. Siding materials and window trim should be consistent on all sides of the structures.
6. **HVAC.** HVAC units shall be located away from the front of the buildings and screened from public view through landscaping and/or screen walls.

This recommendation is based on the following findings:

1. **The zoning, uses and character of the neighborhood:** Properties to the north and west of the subject site are zoned SF-5 Single-Family Residential and developed with single-family homes. The property to the east of the subject site is zoned SF-5 Single Family Residential and is currently undeveloped. Properties to the south of the subject site are zoned B Multi-Family and developed with multi-family units.
2. **The suitability of the subject property for the uses to which it has been restricted:** The property is presently zoned SF-5 Single Family Residential and could be redeveloped with a single-family home.
3. **Extent to which removal of the restrictions will detrimentally affect nearby property:** Most subdivisions platted and developed prior to the 1960s are in use as single-family residences and duplexes. Because of the similarity of residential use, the UZC does not require screening between SF-5 and TF-3 zoning districts.
4. **Conformance of the requested change to the adopted or recognized Comprehensive Plan and policies:** The requested zoning would continue to allow the property to be in conformance with the Community Investments Plan and the Wichita: Places for People Plan.

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5. **Impact of the proposed development on community facilities:** Development of the property with the requested zoning is not anticipated to have significant adverse impacts on community facilities or resources. All public improvements are available to serve the property.

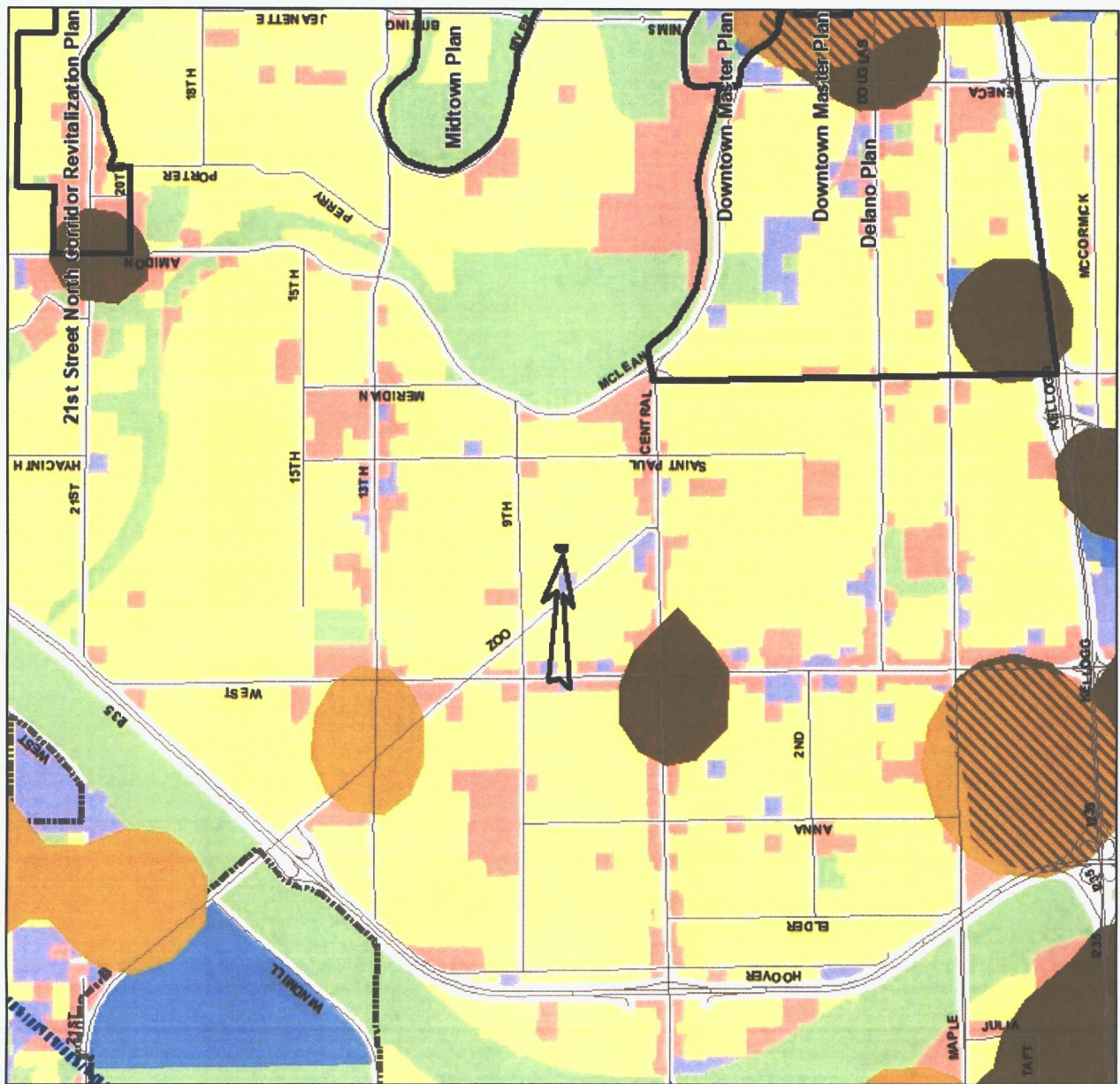
